Daisy Benitez: "Work with your mind, not with your hands." Recent graduate Daisy Benitez grew up hearing these words so often it became her mantra. In fact, her life was shaped by this saying and by the lives of its authors: her parents. As a first-generation college student, Benitez was determined to build a future that her parents once dreamed of. After earning a bachelor's degree in environmental engineering ('17), she will continue her work in sustainability through the Master in Green Technologies program, with her graduate studies funded by the National GEM Consortium Engineering Fellowship, the American Association of University Women (AAUW) Fellowship, and the Switzer Environmental Fellowship. As the first member of her family to earn an undergraduate degree, Benitez never even considered attending graduate

school. For one, she didn't know if she could afford it coming from a low-income household, and two, not many of her friends gave graduate school much thought. It wasn't until last year when Benitez was elected as the Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers student chapter president that the club started encouraging its members to pursue graduate degrees.
