






## **Cooking Together**

## **GREAT DECISIONS**

The **September 24, Monday** Great Decisions meeting will focus on the topic of **South Africa's fragile democracy**. The ruling African National congress (ANC) party has enjoyed comfortable majorities in five general elections since 1994, following independence from white minority rule and the end of a system of institutionalized racial



segregation known as apartheid. There was great hope for a political system and economic development that offered black South Africans a robust civil society. The ANC's dominance, however, is evaporating and its legitimacy has eroded. Political violence and corruption are coupled with whites still controlling the bulk of the country's wealth, an unemployment rate of 25% and millions of shacks and informal dwellings, all of which point to crisis. Come read about South Africa's efforts toward democracy and a transition from a liberation movement to a modern political state.

The discussion for the month involves reading the Great Decisions <u>Briefing</u> <u>Book</u>, watching the <u>DVD</u> presentation by the Foreign Policy Association and meeting in a <u>Discussion Group</u> to discuss the critical global topic. The Branch fund raising donation of \$2,594.54 was also deposited after June 30 so it is not reflected in the published balance. The Scholarship Board of Directors is indebted to all branch members for generous personal donations and the branch fund raising efforts that support the scholarships provided to our local young women.

The Scholarship Board welcomes comments and suggestions and will regularly report to branch members activities of the Scholarship Board through the Branch newsletter. Thank you for your confidence and support, both financially and through your great work.

## AAUW FUNDS ANNOUNCEMENT

WASHINGTON — The American Association of University Women (AAUW) announced awards of \$3.9 million to its 2018–19 class of fellows and grantees. These 250 recipients represent diverse backgrounds, locations, and areas of study but have one thing in common: They all aim to promote equity for women and girls.

"AAUW fellows and grantees have contributed to — and will continue to impact — so much of the world at large," said Kim Churches, the chief executive officer of AAUW. "These trailblazers are breaking the mold in nontraditional fields and redefining what leadership and expertise look like. AAUW is proud to provide the critical resources necessary to help them excel in their chosen fields."

AAUW is one of the world's oldest leading supporters of graduate women's education, having awarded more than \$115 million in fellowships, grants, and awards to 13,000 women and projects from more than 145 countries since 1888. Candidates are evaluated on the basis of scholarly excellence, quality and originality of project design, and active commitment to help-ing women and girls through service in their communities, professions, or fields of research.

AAUW fellowship funding helps women manage the growing burden of student debt, an issue that disproportionately affects women. Unique to AAUW's program, funding may also be used to pay for expenses outside of those traditionally associated with academic study, including child care and transportation — necessities that can help recipients' continue, return to, and successfully complete graduate programs. AAUW prides itself on providing fellowships and grants for women returning to either extend or complete their academic goals.

"We are proud to have these awardees join and add to the over 130-year legacy of our notable alumnae," added Churches. "Recipients now join the ranks of past awardees including journalist Melissa Harris-Perry, Ph.D., and astronaut Judith Resnik, Ph.D., to name a few. These awards change lives and these scholars, they change the world."
