Branch Board Meeting Highlights from February 4, 2019

- Tech Trek Chair, Linda Lidberg, reported a donation of \$500 received from Melford Borzall, Inc. to Tech Trek.
- Jean Slater reported the need to "SOB" (SAVE OUR BRANCH) due to declining membership and the
 need for more members to <u>actively</u> participate in Branch leadership and projects. Ideas to deal with
 these concerns will be sought from members at the next General Meeting, Feb. 18th.
- Marilyn Corey distributed the revised job descriptions for each office in accordance with the new governance system recently adopted by the Branch.
- Pat Muhlethaler suggested members have an option of listing an emergency contact to be reached if necessary when attending Branch activities. Said list to be held by the President, Secretary, and Membership Chair.

SAVE OUR BRANCH

A participatory discussion was held at the February 18 General Meeting related to declining Branch membership and the need for actively filling Branch leadership roles.

Our membership has declined to 59 members for the 2018-2019 year, a decrease from 71 members in 2017-2018. The Nominating Committee has not found a member willing to serve as President for 2019-2020. Our current Treasurer and Secretary have graciously agreed to serve one more year, but what about the year after?

The active discussion centered on the following questions:

Why be a member of Five Cities Pismo Beach AAUW?
Why be a member of the local AAUW leadership board?
What actions should we take to recruit new members?
What actions should we take to retain members?
Should we close our branch due to dwindling membership?
Should our local Branch combine with another Branch for continued stability?



A lively discussion resulted with discussion groups listing the positives and negatives of each question. It was clearly decided that we want to **Save Our Branch**. We do not want to close our branch or combine our branch. **We want our Branch!!**

Ideas flowed in answering the questions about retaining, recruiting, being a member or a leader of our Branch. It was noted that highlighting the role of AAUW on the political, national and international scene may attract women interested in more national and global issues, in addition to our Branch activities.

A committee of Kathi Pettersen, Susan Brazil, Laurie King, Jean Burns Slater, and Mary Matakovich will tackle the task of developing an action plan to **Save Our Branch**. Look for the plan and activities in the May newsletter in which you can help move our branch into the next 5, 10, 20 years!!

Lunch Bunch










Daytime Page Turners

Member Highlight Claire Phillips Gordon

January 23, 1919 - June 3, 2016 Claire, the daughter of William and Reba Phillips, graduated from Los Angeles High School at age 16, having skipped two years. She attended <u>UCLA</u>, where she was a member of the Alumni Association, and received her degree from UC Berkeley in 1939. While secretary for Duke Ellington in New York City, she met her future husband, Irving Gordon, a songwriter for Ellington, and composer of the song



"Unforgettable" for Nat King Cole. After a divorce, she married Kenneth Williams Fertig, known as Ken Williams, actor and radio/TV announcer. Following his death, she married William Joe Peel, who survives her, along with two sons from the first marriage, William P. Gordon, Ph.D., Richard Eliot Gordon, and a grandson, Jonathan Paul Gordon. She is the author of several books, including Boy Meets Horn, My Unforgettable Jazz Friends, The Color of Music, and had just completed a historical novel about the role of Jews in Columbus's voyage to the New World. She died peacefully in her sleep at the age of 97 at her home in Arroyo Grande, California.

Public Policy

A Big Day for Fair Pay

On January 30, the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate introduced the <u>Paycheck Fairness</u> <u>Act</u> (PFA) with support from every Democrat in Congress and bipartisan backing in the House. "The PFA is essential to eradicating practices that have perpetuated the pay gap for far too long," says AAUW CEO Kim Churches.

The team at AAUW was instrumental in prioritizing the bill by sending letters to Congress and engaging grassroots advocates, garnering 260 organizations in support. They also presented on the PFA to new members of Congress and spoke at the press conference introducing the bill.


The PFA would update the Equal Pay Act of 1963 and complement the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009, which ensures pay discrimination can be challenged regardless of when it began. We were thrilled to bring Ledbetter to Washington, D.C., where she met with more than a dozen members of Congress. The PFA is now designated as H.R. 7, signaling it is a top 10 priority of the House.













TECH TREK

Teacher recommendations have been received from the science and math teachers at the three middle schools in the Lucia Mar Unified School District: Mesa, Judkins, and Paulding. The rec-

ommended girls will have until March 1st to get their application and 500 word essay to me. The Tech Trek team will schedule interviews with each applicant on March 10th. At that time we had hoped to find 8 great candidates for Tech Trek and alternates who might fill any vacancies that come up, however, AAUW California Tech Trek has decided to reduce the size of the UCSB camp to a total of 80 girls each week — down from 96. Therefore, we have been told that we will only be able to send 6 girls this year. Our fund-raising and donations have enabled us to pay for 8 girls to attend (and I will still campaign for 8) so the balance will carry over to next year's Tech Trek account.

The girls selected will be presented to our membership at our April meeting.
