# **Daytime Page Turners**




## **Finessing Fems Bridge Group**



## Spotlight on Branch member Carole Dempsey

Philly born, Vassar Graduate, East Coast Corporate, only child with a father fixated on education, Masters from Columbia... How in the world did Carole Dempsey find Five Cities Pismo Beach AAUW?

After graduate school Carole began her career with interviewing doctors in the pharmaceutical arena, moving from sales to marketing, then into a research analyst position for the Sandoz Pharmaceuticals now known as Novartis. This career direction, combining the science of healing medi-



cine with thinking and writing critically, played well for Carole who stayed with the company for 30 years, retiring as Executive Director of Marketing Communications. One of her early achievements was to win both the Sales and Marketing Excellence awards. After retirement, she opened her own consulting business in the same field for 15 years in Arizona. One of her life beliefs is "go with what you love" as exemplified by her career.

A friend of Carole's moved to San Luis Obispo, spurring Carole to take a look at this county. After Carole met Sandee in Templeton, moved back to Arizona, and then decided to return to the Central Coast, they found the perfect home in Mesa View, Arroyo Grande. And she also found our Five Cities Pismo Beach AAUW Branch! One of the attractions of AAUW for Carole is the strong support of women's education. She believes that a strong background in liberal arts, providing training in oral and written communication, along with critical thinking serves as the springboard for a large variety of careers.

Carole believes in the proverb "if the student is willing the teacher will appear". This philosophy drives her current interests as travel takes a back seat. Her interests include cacti, succulents and their planting pots for which she categorizes, photographs, researches and files information. Dreams and their subconscious messages are another focus, integrating the outer with the inner of her life. "Be awake, be conscious" guides Carole in her self-exploration. She saves nuggets of wisdom for inspiration and is writing vignettes in a conversation style with a writing group of likeminded people. Carole and Sandee co-authored a 60 page story called a "Summer Romance between 2 Lawn Ornaments", including pictures of the hero and heroine.

#### KEY SUCCESSES IN LEGISLATION – We're Making Progress

AAUW California LEGISLATIVE AGENDA FOR 2019

The Public Policy Committee met in March and reviewed state bills that relate to our mission and priorities. Some bills were not in their final form and we had to wait for more information before making decisions on our positions. As soon as the list of our priority bills is complete, it will be posted on the website and you will be informed of the posting.

In the meantime, we can celebrate progress on two key bills:

#### FEDERAL: Paycheck Fairness Act (PFA)

This federal measure has passed the House of Representatives and now goes to the Senate for consideration. It expands on the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act which ensured that ongoing pay discrimination can be challenged regardless of when it began. The PFA that would give employees and employers the new tools to close the pay gap:


- Require employers to prove that pay disparities between men and women are a business necessity and job-related.
- Ban the use of salary history, which has been shown to negatively impact women.
- Protect workers from being penalized for discussing their salaries.
- Help employers implement fair-pay practices.

#### STATE: SB 171 (Jackson)

This is one of AAUW's key bills. It is moving through the state Senate (house of origin). This bill addresses the need for accurate information from employers (100 employees or more) on wage patterns, including employee numbers by race, ethnicity and sex in listed job categories, and provide data on their annual earnings. This information would be gathered at the state level. The information would be used to better enforce equal pay or discrimination laws.

#### IT'S STILL APRIL! EQUAL PAY DAY – April 2, 2019

I hope many branches planned Equal Pay Day activities. If not, it's not too late to highlight the need for pay equity. You could still write a letter to the editor or remind your branch members that women's earnings still lag behind men's earnings and that economic inequality continues to work against the empowerment of women.

## The Status of Women and Girls in CA ~ 2019

For the past eight years Mt. St. Mary's University in Los Angeles, (the only all-women's higher educational institution in the area), has published a report assessing the status of women and girls in the state of California. This year's report entitled, *Intersections: Identity, Access and Equity* "celebrates the gains women have made and the challenges they continue to confront in areas like economic well-being, health and wellness, workforce factors and safety." It presents an overview of how women of different races and ethnicities are faring in CA. The following bills passed during the last legislative session were significant in making strides toward greater equity for California's women and girls; you may recognize some of them.

**BOARD OF DIRECTORS:** Mandates a baseline representation of female identified persons on the board of directors of each publicly held corporation whose principal executive offices are in California. (SENATE BILL 826, JACK-SON)

**DISCLOSURE OF SALARY HISTORY:** Prohibits employers from seeking salary history information and making a subsequent salary determination for applicants, thereby improving pay equity. (ASSEMBLY BILL 168, EGGMAN)

**LACTATION ACCOMMODATION:** Requires employers to designate an area close to the workspace — excluding bathrooms — for employees who wish to express breast milk. (ASSEMBLY BILL 1976, LIMÓN)

**MARRIAGE AND DOMESTIC PARTNERSHIP: MINORS.** Ensures additional levels of protection before a youth may marry or establish a domestic partnership by 1) providing information about their rights of termination and dissolution directly to children and 2) requiring involved parties to participate in premarital counseling. (SENATE BILL 273, HILL)

**EXTORTION:** Expands the crime of extortion to include consideration of sexual conduct or images of intimate body parts. (SENATE BILL 500, LEYVA)

**CALWORKS MODIFICATIONS:** Authorizes domestic violence survivors who are recipients of California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs) benefits to be eligible for CalWORKs homeless assistance. (ASSEMBLY BILL 557, RUBIO)
