What's AAUW Public Policy All About?

Since AAUW's founding in 1881, our advocates have taken positions on the fundamental issues of the day – educational, social, economic, and political. Our positions emanate from our Mission, Vision and Values:

- Mission: To advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy
- > Vision: Equity for all
- ➤ Values: Nonpartisan. Fact based. Integrity. Inclusion. Intersectionality.

Our positions are rooted in our member-approved Public Policy Priorities at both the national and state levels. The AAUW California Public Policy Priorities for 2019-2021 were approved by our members this spring, and can be found on the website www.aauw-ca.org. The AAUW CA Public Policy Committee meets early in each legislative session to review bills and determine those on which to take action. In Washington, AAUW staff and volunteer advocates communicate with both Congress and the administration. In California, we employ a part-time lobbyist to represent AAUW CA in the California Legislature.

Economic Security is a critical issue for women of all ages, a foundational aspect of everyday life, and is particularly important to women's ability to support themselves and their families. Many continue to struggle with economic insecurity, wage discrimination, and employment benefits. Legislated solutions could benefit many women.

Real change in federal and state policy, however, will only come about when our elected officials hear from voters, like us! It is so important that branch members be up to date on AAUW positions on federal and state legislation consistent with AAUW's mission, and contact elected officials to share our positions. And we must hold those we have elected accountable as they vote on issues affecting women and girls.

Become involved with your branch's Public Policy Committee. If your branch doesn't have one, start one! You can download and print a copy of the Public Policy Priorities from www.aauw-ca/category/publicpolicy. Become an activist, by signing up on the national website aauw.org/resource/two-minute-activist. This will connect you with both state and national calls to action.

Start now! It's not too soon to begin educating yourself about the issues in the important 2020 elections!

Scholarship Update

Thank you, Thank you. The Scholarship Board of Directors continue to be appreciative of the hard work and effort demonstrated by the generosity of Claire Gordon and Mr. Steve Sproger through their estate donations and our local Branch members in completing these two separate estate sales.

The Scholarship Endowment Fund has bounced to \$134,254 as of August 28, 2019. The AAUW Scholarship Corporation recognizes that the Scholarship Endowment Fund will have a lasting legacy for generations and this never could happen with the support of our Branch and community. Thank you sincerely.

After the September 2019 Branch Board meeting, it was determined that Scholarship would be allocated 10% of the Branch fund-raising proceeds, resulting in the distribution of \$882.81 from the proceeds of 2018-2019.

Specific donations to Scholarship are always welcome and can be directed toward the Endowment Fund or current 2020 scholarships for senior high girls. An AVID scholarship will continue to be a focus, supported in the same manner as all other scholarships.

Spotlight: Susan Opava

With a father in lithography and two older siblings, how could Susan not read at the age of 3? When Susan was raised in the Bronx, it was more like a suburb of Manhattan, not as concentrated and allowing an eight-year-old to walk safely alone to the Bronx library. Susan was considered a bit exceptional so she was expected to go to college.

Susan's mother died when Susan was thirteen and her father worked diligently to care for the family, assigning home chores to the 4 children. He expected Susan to have enough of an education to be independent, so she was guided toward 16 years of private Catholic education, graduating from the College of Mount Saint Vincent in New York.

She was a bit of a rebel, publishing suggestions as to how to get around/modify the strict rules of her schools. Susan's interest in science was sparked by two different science mentors, one in high school and one in college. Her college mentor was a Catholic nun with a Ph.D in physiology and soon Susan was hooked. She previously thought she would be a United Nations simultaneous language translator or a pediatrician with a free clinic in Harlem, but in her senior year she settled on a teaching and research career in renal physiology.

Scholarships and fellowships supported her endeavors and she earned her Ph.D. in Physiology at the University of Michigan, followed by postdoctoral work at Dartmouth. She met her husband in graduate school and, after tough job hunting for two professors at one university, they were both hired at the University of Puerto Rico Medical School to enhance a growing physiology department. Susan thrived in Puerto Rico both professionally and personally, but with two teenage sons and almost 20 years at the University of Puerto Rico, she knew it was time to move on. Drug-related murders were increasing in San Juan and she was concerned about the safety of her children. In addition, she had been pulled toward an administrative career and the politics within the country and university were a detriment to her advancement in that area.

Before Susan left the UPR she had obtained an NIH grant to establish a Research Center for Minority Institutions on the campus, bringing in ~1.5 million dollars during the first year alone, and increasing each year. This program, which she ran for the first seven years, is still in place after 32 years, and is one of Susan's proudest accomplishments.

An administrative position as Dean of Research and Graduate Programs at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo ended Susan's job search in 1993. She held this position for more than 19 years, retiring in 2012.

Susan's personal interests include reading, crosswords, tennis, socializing with friends, grand-parenting, and travel to immerse herself in the culture of other countries. Susan knows that when working in education you never feel that your job is worthless and you can have a positive impact by contributing to the community and society. Hence, Susan is here with us at Five Cities Pismo Beach AAUW, with a focus on education and community!



Money raised will go to AAUW Funds, Tech Trek, plus High School and Cuesta scholarships.


