## Scholarship

The Scholarship Board of Directors held their first meeting of the year on September 25, 2019. Several important decisions were made after reviewing current policy and our investment endowment fund.

A conservative estimate of possible revenue from the Endowment Fund for this fiscal year is $\$ 4,300$. Branch fund raising contributed $\$ 882.81$ for a possible total of $\$ 5,183$ readily available for scholarship.
The Board decided to offer 4 scholarships for the 2019-2020 year, two to Arroyo Grande High School, one to Nipomo and New Tech High combined and one to an AVID scholar.
Consideration of the size of the high schools encouraged this distribution as Arroyo Grande High has a student population of 2,071, Nipomo High's population is 920 and New Tech High is 313 . The exact amount of the scholarship awards will be determined as we see if there are additional donations to scholarship.
This last year $\$ 6,000$ was distributed to 4 awardees. Specific donations to Scholarship are always welcome and can be directed toward the Endowment Fund or current 2020 scholarships for senior high girls. An AVID scholarship will continue to be a focus, supported in the same manner as all other scholarships.
The AAUW Scholarship Corporation recognizes that the Scholarship Endowment Fund will have a lasting legacy for generations and this never could happen with the support of our Branch and community. Thank you s Jean Burns Slater

Queen of the Indiana Decatur County Fair, farm girl raised among soybeans and corn, trumpet player, and member of the junior leadership for 4-H in high school. Marilyn Corey's family farm only installed electricity when she was in the $3^{\text {rd }}$ grade, indoor plumbing when she was in the $8^{\text {th }}$ grade. She was a student band leader within a musical family. She was taught to drive a tractor and expected to attend Indiana University.

The University felt like home to her as her high school acquainted the students to this local institution. Marilyn's grandmother attended college providing a role model. However, after two years, Marilyn quit college due to a romantic break up and returned home to work in a factory. Later she visited her former university for Homecoming and realized that is where
 she should be! With financial support from her deceased grandmother she put herself back on track. Her father noted her determination and supported her renewed efforts. Off Marilyn went. She reconnected with her former love interest, married, and finished her elementary education credential, enjoying teaching. For health reasons Marilyn with her husband moved to a "dryer climate". California was the choice.

After adding two boys to their family, Marilyn returned to work with in-home care for her little ones. Teaching grades $1-4$, serving as a resource teacher and attending Cal State Long Beach for her administrative credential, moved Marilyn through her career right into an administrative position. She continued to work in Orange County moving into a Director of Educational Services position and then to Assistant Superintendent.

Her marriage dissolved and Marilyn took a position as a Superintendent, joining only three female Superintendents in California. She met Stan Corey when he was Superintendent of Irvine USD and Marilyn, who decided she would never marry again, fell for this handsome, professional leader. They became the only husband and wife serving as Superintendents in the State. Marilyn and Stan were married 33 years and shared great interest in travelling with a motor home, all through the west. Following retirement, Marilyn served in several roles as an interim Superintendent and consultant.

Marilyn's family includes two sons, four step children, one of which is deceased, 11 grandchildren, 12 nieces and nephews and lots of love and attention. She keeps in contact with her sons, step children and grandchildren, who helped her with home projects and repairs.

Her philosophy of life comes from her father with a "can do" attitude, a strict upbringing, and an active sense of politics with civic responsibility. Marilyn loves gardening and is raising herbs and tomatoes for her cooking. She believes in "live and let live", allowing everyone the right to their own viewpoint.

Marilyn is committed to AAUW and enjoys the fund raising and camaraderie of the members. In addition to her AAUW activities, she has served as president for 5 of her 6 years on the Board of her Homeowners Association. Playing Bridge is her passion.
