

Tech Trek 2020 Update

In January, the Tech Trek information and applications will go out to the three middle schools in the Lucia Mar Unified School District. Thanks to our fund-raising last year as well as donations, I had hoped to be able to send 8 girls to the UCSB camp next summer, however, a recent email from the State Tech Trek coordinators have changed our plans.



Our branch will only be able to send five girls in 2020. The State Tech Trek organization is trying to negotiate with two other colleges to increase their capacity to accept campers but it is uncertain if that will happen. The Tech Trek program is exceptional because the camper to teacher and camper to dorm mom ratios allow all who attend to receive the best and most secure experience; over-crowding a camp would not benefit anyone.

Spotlight: Rose Ann Steiner



Family; a small west Texas town; twelve cousins and two siblings; strong faith in God; a farm/ ranch with cattle, wheat, cotton; high morals and a strong work ethic. What could go wrong? A drought in the 1950's resulted in selling the farm, a change of life for the family. The father owned service stations and farmed; the mother worked for the Chamber of Commerce in Shamrock, Texas.

The dream of attending college seemed doubtful, but Rose Ann received two scholarships from the PTA and a civic organization which helped pay the tuition for two years at Texas Tech University. Rose Ann began as a speech and drama major, but with the suggestion that she earn a teaching credential also. This solid advice lead Rose Ann to becoming a speech pathologist with an English minor. She worked hard for her education in her studies and summer jobs.

Her parents moved to New Mexico, so with the family out of state, increased tuition hit Rose Ann. She worked summer jobs in the post office, the telephone company, did private tutoring and in her father's business to earn money for college.

Rose Ann was the first in her family to graduate from college. Her parents both attended college but did not complete a degree. Her example set her siblings and cousins on the college path. Her family connections continue today with regular reunions.

Her first teaching job was in Denver. She lived with several teachers, enjoying the single life. She met her husband, Jim, in Denver and after a transfer, as a financial controller for Ryder Transportation Systems, they married and moved to California. Rose Ann applied for a California teaching credential, which required additional course work at Cal State LA. She worked in Compton, teaching 3rd grade. She then spent 31 years in El Rancho School District as a speech pathologist and in a self-contained classroom with language disordered students.

Her two sons readjusted her life, and she began her involvement with the Whittier AAUW branch, 500 members strong in 1973. She was involved in Reading, Interruption, and Performance as a branch member in addition to other responsibilities. She spent 35 years in public education which she describes as a wonderful career and 46 years as an AAUW member.

After Jim retired, they moved to Arroyo Grande in 1997. Bridge, golf, book groups, church, travel, computer activities to "stay in the loop" and volunteerism round out Rose Ann's life. She and Jim have two sons...one is a certified welder with a local construction company and builds cell towers. Their other son lives in Tucson and is a CPA in hospital administration. They have two grandchildren.

The family-instilled work ethic, determination and AAUW philanthropy guide Rose Ann's retirement. "Be the best you can, help others as much as you can," is solid advice from a genteel, gentle Texas woman who continues to give back through our local AAUW, and our branch leadership with her energy, guidance and resources.




