# SPOTLIGHT ON... ??? MYSTERY WOMAN ???

I owa born and raised, educated at the University of Minnesota, lived in Greeley Colorado, moved to California before moving to Washington State, New Hampshire and three different locations in California and then settling down as a retiree in Arroyo Grande. Now who could this be? She had a five-year courtship ending with a Hawaiian theme for her wedding in Minnesota. She was the first of her family to attend college, obtaining a nursing degree and later returned to college in her forties for a second degree in physical therapy.

Her youth family believed that she should attend college but there were no serious plans made to finance or support her. She was awarded a scholarship from a woman's organization and that set her on her way. She met her husband while she was horseback riding at the University of Minnesota and soon followed him as he completed his studies at the University of Northern Colorado. She worked as a lab tech in Colorado and after going to New York to set up a lab for her boss, her then boyfriend decided she should be his wife and within a month they were married with that Hawaiian theme wedding.

They had two children, a girl and a boy and she followed her husband's career path with Univac, one of the earliest commercial computer employers, finally landing in the Silicon Valley. However, our spotlight woman continued in her own career path, advancing herself, earning a Phi Theta Kappa award in Physical Therapy, working in water therapy for people with physical limitations.

Our spotlight woman discovered the central coast when her daughter attended the University of California at San Diego and in settling a family member's estate after death. Once they found Avila, they purchased a home and a sail boat and proceeded to sail 5,000 miles along the California and Baja, Mexico, coast on a 36 foot sail boat.

They were fully self-contained with a wind generator, solar power, radar, water maker, diesel motor, and checked in with a group of other sailors for general safety; flying home once in a while to check family. This journey lasted for 2 years before selling the sail boat and settling down in Arroyo Grande, where they have lived for 18 years.

Hobbies include outdoors with gardening, biking, sailing, snorkeling, snow skiing, pool exercise, and kayaking. She drove her own Honda 400 cc motorcycle for many years. She enjoys music and thus attends Bluegrass festivals, follows her husband's band to gigs, and plays her ukulele once in a while. She has bicycled in Europe five times and ten countries. Travel broadens her world to see what other people value.

She believes in giving back to college-age women and has participated in Women in History with our Branch. She has accepted the challenge of a life adjustment as her husband has developed serious health issues. Her philosophy of life is, "you are never too old to learn something new."
