SYNOPSIS:

Positive thinking reduces stress and you can enjoy life more!

Positive psychology is the scientific study of what makes life most worth living. In this presentation, we will focus on positive events and influences in life.

Moreover, we will discuss what stress is, how to recognize common stress symptoms, and how positive psychology can help you manage them.

Why is this important? Because stress that's left unchecked can contribute to many health problems, such as high blood pressure, heart disease, obesity and diabetes."

ELECTION NEWS

Five Cities Pismo Beach and San Luis Obispo Branches will be staffing the Voter Service Center at the Old San Luis Obispo Airport on Saturday, October 31st; Sunday, November 1st; Monday, November 2nd, and Tuesday, November 3rd.

An entirely new format for voting in person, as well as depositing 'Vote By Mail' ballots has been planned due to the corona virus pandemic.

Eight current members, two former members, and ten family and/or friends will be welcoming voters to this new experience in addition to three members who will work all four days. *~Linda Lidberg*

President Susan Brazil opened the October General Branch meeting at 6:30 PM, attended by 24 AAUW members on Zoom.

Fundraising is on hold except for manning the polling place for 4 days along with SLO AAUW members. We hope to net ~\$3,000, thanks to our volunteers.

Tech Trek is on hold until January. If they decide to run a virtual event, do we want to participate?

RIF has 1,000 books to distribute. Wendy Robinson is checking into how to get these books to the students.

The October program led by Kathi Pettersen, was on **Scholarship**. She began by giving her long history of being involved with AAUW Scholarships.

At the moment, 11 AAUW members are serving as directors on the Scholarship Board. The committee could use one more director.

Schools have already been contacted. More details will be decided on in November.

Detailed Scholarship information and sample applications were emailed to the members prior to the meeting. Treasurer Maurina Kusell reviewed the Scholarship history. The goal is to keep a \$100,000 endowment fund and award scholarships on the yield, which is approximately \$4,000/year. In 2020, our branch was able to award 6 scholarships of \$1,500.

Maureen Kelly discussed the application process. Applications will be available online in early December for the three high schools, with the due date in early March. Applications will be reviewed and narrowed down by the Board.

After the Scholarship Committee has chosen the interviewees, interview dates will be set up in early April - probably on Zoom.

Scholarship winners will be asked to attend Five Cities' AAUW April General meeting to accept the scholarship certificate and to share personal and educational goals with members.

Next month's meeting will be led by Michelle Clark, who will speak on Positive Thinking. Michelle spoke to us last January about Healthy Aging.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:30 by Susan Brazil.

SPOTLIGHT ON MAUREEN KELLY



Imagine, arriving at Arroyo Grande in a VW bug with all your possessions, to begin teaching with the Lucia Mar Unified School District in 1974. Teaching jobs were hard to come by and after living in San Francisco, as a city girl, you were ready to move on. Your parents are well educated and you are the oldest of five children, the trend setter. Your Palo Alto childhood was idyllic, summers at a cabin in Fallen Leaf Lake near Tahoe, private school for your first 10 years of education, loving parents with an expectation of independent and well-educated children. Your aspiration was to attend UC Berkeley, but you ended up at UC Davis. You immersed yourself in the French language through a year in Aix-en-Provence, France, transferring all credits toward your undergraduate degree, declaring art, French as majors and History as a minor.

Post-graduation you lived in San Francisco for two years, working at a French restaurant, a plant store, among other jobs. You decided to earn a teaching credential at San Francisco State. After an interview at the college placement center you were hired for Lucia Mar USD, with one week to move, begin your teaching job and meet the Central Coast of California. Once in Arroyo Grande, you were ready to teach

after finding a studio apartment, but missing San Francisco, where you returned each weekend for the lively life. You eventually settled in on the Central Coast, made friends, taught at Paulding Junior High for 4 years, then 5th grade, back to Junior High, eventually teaching at the high school level for more than 20 years, enjoying your students at every level, always gaining their admiration and respect.

You earned a Master's in Education Administration with the intention of using it in the future. After 35 years with Lucia Mar School District, you retired. You now have the time and energy to travel. After retiring, you traveled back to Aix-en-Provence, South Korea to visit your daughter when she was living there, and went on a great tour of China, trips to Canada, Mexico, Costa Rica, several trips to Italy, and a fabulous tour of Morocco last year. And now you are very ready to go traveling in 2021. When not traveling, you provide dog-care for 2 grand dogs and are expecting a grandchild in the near future.

You love where you live, and want others to enjoy life, stay healthy, be kind, generous, and fair, travel much and be a world citizen when travelling, appreciative of cultures and habits of the local populace.

PUBLIC POLICY

Three ways to help motivate civic engagement, even in a time of lockdowns and social distancing. <u>Voting Rights are not just for this election, but for every election!</u>

Involvement in the political process is always important, but it is especially so now as we move toward the 2020 election and any future elections. In addition, voter rights and election education does not stop on November 3. Elections are instrumental in our democratic process, so constant education is a must for informed voters beyond November 3. Remember your vote today and in the future is of utmost importance. Your informed influence on others is key for informed voting.

Voter Access

Voting is a fundamental American right, yet exercising that right isn't always easy. Certain jurisdictions attempt to restrict voting under the guise of preventing "voter fraud," even though that is an extremely rare occurrence. Rather than restrict voting, we need to prioritize expanding options for casting a ballot, particularly as the pandemic threatens to hinder some voters' ability to turn out at the polls on a single day. There is no "one-method-fits-all" approach to voter access: Early voting, voting by mail and no-excuse absentee voting should all be offered as options, in addition to in-person voting on November 3, with appropriate public health safety precautions.

How you can help: Start by making a simple phone call to your governor, Secretary of State and the state Board of Elections. Ask two critical questions: 1.) Is an absentee ballot available so that I can vote safely during the public health crisis? 2.) What is being done to ensure safe and broadly accessible elections for all? Tell these officials you are a constituent and that you are concerned that the upcoming elections won't be conducted in a way that will allow all voters to participate.

On a federal level, call your <u>Senator</u> to let them know you support the <u>Voting Rights Advancement Act</u> of 2019. The bill was passed by the House in December and is now before the Senate Committee on the Judiciary. It calls for reviewing voting changes in jurisdictions nationwide, focusing on measures that have historically been used to discriminate against voters.

Getting Out the Vote

Increasing voter turnout is a top priority for the 2020 election. The more people who vote, the better our representative democracy will function. You can help get out the vote (GOTV) by making sure that all eligible voters are registered (and their registration is current) and that they know how and where to cast their ballot. As election day draws closer, check to see if voters have all the information they need: Do they know which polling places are open and ready for people to go in safely? Are they able to request an absentee ballot, and if so, have they requested it by their jurisdiction's deadlines? Do they know how send in the ballot itself and by what day it needs to be postmarked? These are critical questions to ask ourselves and our communities.

What you can do: Personal connections are most effective to inspire voters, but in this current environment, traditional efforts like door-to-door canvassing are not advised. Instead, use targeted phone calls and social media outreach. Connect with activists in your community to get involved with phone and text banking. Write postcards and letters to voters, sending them by mail or via no-contact drop-off. Whenever possible, keep your messaging personal and direct.

Voter Education

The more voters know about the candidates we elect – and where they stand on important issues – the more likely we are to choose leaders whose views align with our own. This is the time to start direct conversations about specific voter issues and help people understand what's at stake.

Use such resources as the American Association of University Women's 2020 <u>Voter Issue Guide</u>, which provides information on key issues like the gender pay gap, family leave and paid sick days, college affordability, campus sexual violence, voting rights, and health care and reproductive rights.

What you can do: In addition to educating yourself on what's at stake in the 2020 election and future elections, you can help educate others by partnering with advocacy groups or like-minded people in your community to host an "Issues Forum." These can be panel discussions with experts, tele-town halls with candidates, or even a smaller conversation within your social network. Invite people you know who would be interested, and ask them to invite their friends. Learn where your local candidates stand on the issues, prepare a list of questions to get the conversation started. Take information from our resources, (virtually) gather voters in your communities, and remind everyone that our economic security, education, and reproductive & general health are essential to this democracy.

<u>PLEASE NOTE</u>: Due to Covid guidelines, most meetings/interest groups that meet face-to-face have been CANCELLED until further notice. We encourage your groups to try online options to stay connected, such as Group Facetime and Zoom, or by other social distancing options.


