Finally, all participants will be given full training in a Zoom webinar on **March 22**, **2021**, at **7:00** p.m.



### **AAUW CALIFORNIA SUPPORTED BILLS**



### Bills PASSED in 2020

BILL NO.	DESCRIPTION
AB 732	Regulations for "dignified healthcare" for incarcerated pregnant women before & after birth
AB 1185	Authorizes counties to establish oversight boards for law enforcement agencies
AB 1196	Prohibits law enforcement agencies from using carotid artery or chokeholds
AB 1506	Creates a DOJ Review Board to investigate police killings upon request from law enforcement agency
AB 1927	Sexual assault victims can't be prosecuted for drug/or alcohol offense from assault trial testimony
AB 2416	Homeless students can get financial aid even if they can't meet "satisfactory progress" requirement
AB 2762	Prohibits sale of adulterated cosmetics
AB 3070	Creates assumption of prejudice when non-white jurors are excluded
AB 3121	Creates a Task Force to study and make recommendations on reparations to Blacks for the lingering negative effects of slavery
SB 973	Requires companies with 100+ employees to report pay data on employees by sex and race
SB 1383	Provides all employees right to take unpaid leave in excess of vacation time to enroll child in school and attend school activities or address school emergencies

Be comfortable in the aging process, recognizing difficult situations and try your best to be supportive and understanding with friends and family as they age. Aging offers no time for negatively. AAUW women and men have the responsibility to share their story and encourage the young women of today to move forward and move on. So where do these gems of wisdom come from? Gaye Peltzman!

Imagine going from Durango, Colorado, to San Diego California in 1940 as a toddler with a dad helping the war effort, using a draft deferment to work in aerospace at Ryan Aeronautics. Your family has three children, live in a trailer until you eventually move to Pacific Beach in San Diego area.

You knew that education was important and you went into a teaching career at San Diego State University, even though you were really interested in the Forest Service. You married young, moved to Los Angeles, and realized that the marriage was a mistake. You then met Ed in Los Angeles. While teaching in Burbank at the elementary level, Ron Howard was a student. You moved to Santa Clarita, while raising your family of two adopted, at infancy, children.

After teaching 11 additional years and experiencing a very difficult year, you left teaching. But you did not leave advocating for children as you started a story time in the local library with as many as 40 people gathering for the events focusing on preschoolers. Your diagnosis of cancer in 2001 curtailed your library work and allowed you to observe yourself objectively as you learned about the disease and treatment.

You decided that a move was due and began to look for a home on the Central Coast, moving into your current home in Arroyo Grande. Ed was ready to retire and packed up for this new destination. Cancer provided time to refocus and drop everything. You took up quilting. Caring for aging parents allowed you to recognize the need to accept the aging process as part of the cycle of life.

After taking an Interior design class, you proceeded to remodel your home before you moved in, and this sparked an interest that continued into your philanthropy work with the SLO Botanical Gardens. You were the construction coordinator of the Botanical Gardens building and redesigned the



kitchen to commercial standards, working with all of the trades people, coordinating colors and cabinets, tile, lighting, plumbing and wood details.

After joining AAUW in 2004-05, you assumed a variety of responsibilities from Lunch Bunch, Program Vice President and Branch Co-President.

In addition to your community work, you and Ed travelled extensively internationally. International travel is curtailed due to COVID and health concerns, but state wide travel is of interest. You love gardening (currently focusing on grow pots for herbs, swiss chard, onions, etc., on your porch), quilting, and reading. Your advanced cooking skills are shared with good friends.

Your son lives in Corona, California, college educated and developed his own company. Your daughter lives in Idaho and has one son, aged 17.

As your life matures into the future, you live by your words of wisdom, and all of our AAUW Branch members are thankful!! Gaye Peltzman, may we all learn from you!

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### **TECH TREK 2021**

The State AAUW Tech Trek organization has decided to hold **Virtual Tech Trek** "camps" in 2021. The format for this virtual camp was piloted late last summer by the San Diego branch after the in-person camps were cancelled. Working with Qualcom, a tech company in San Diego, a robotics program where the camp attendees worked from home, was undertaken. While the feedback from the campers on the camp was positive, at the time the 7th grade campers had not had a year of virtual schooling. Technology issues that arose were handled by the local tech company.

After attending a 90-minute Zoom meeting about the 2021 Virtual Tech Trek Camp, Linda Lidberg reported out to the Board the information she learned about the virtual camp. The five-day program would have 48 girls in attendance, working from home on their own computers approximately 7 hours a day, broken into two three-hour sections and a one-hour section. There would be at least three five-day camps, with a potential for a fourth. After a morning group session, the girls would be divided into "rooms" of 6 with a robotics build coach and a social coach. These coaches would be AAUW volunteers who would also be online.

The cost to the branch would be \$400 per girl. Fund-raising was encouraged to fund this year's camp but tapping into last year's camp money on reserve with the Special Projects Fund could be used if fund-raising was insufficient.

After the information was presented several issues were discussed at the board meeting:

- 1. Reports from local teachers report that students are burned out on virtual learning.
- 2. Board members were concerned that this did not provide the same bonding, in-person experience of being on a college campus that Tech Trek usually provides.
- 3. Asking previous Tech Trek donors to donate again when last year's money had not been used, especially during this economic downturn, was problematic.
- 4. The entire focus of the camp would be on robotics and not the usual variety of classes and projects and the local Lucia Mar school district has a strong robotics program.
- 5. Technology issues could be a concern. The time online, the band width needed, and the ability to have an available working space in which to do the robotics project could be an issue. Chromebook computers, used by the students for virtual schooling, do not support the platform this Tech Trek program uses.

Following the discussion, the Board voted NOT to participate in the 2021 Virtual Tech Trek camp and to use the money on reserve with Special Projects for the 2022 Tech Trek camp that will hopefully be a real in-person camp.
