#### AAUW CALIFORNIA RESPONSE TO JANUARY 6th

January 17, 2021

Dear AAUW California Members:

*On January 11, 2021, AAUW CEO Kim Churches released a statement to all members decrying the events that unfolded in our nation's capital on January 6th.* 

AAUW California joins with our CEO in condemning the actions of these insurgents, as well as those of our governmental officials who were complicit in encouraging them by continuing to spread the falsehood that the election was fraudulent. Those officials include the president himself, as well as the seven California congressmen who opposed certification of the electoral college votes on the basis of this unproven allegation.

AAUW California supports a strong and viable democracy, which relies at its heart on the premise of the peaceful transfer of power following free and fair elections. This premise is shaken to its core when lies and misinformation are spread by those at our highest levels of government. Over fifty lawsuits have been filed by the president and others claiming the election was fraudulent; all of them, at both the state and national level, have been rejected as totally devoid of evidence.

We encourage members to contact your representatives to demand immediate action be taken to hold the president accountable for his role in inciting this insurrection. And if you are in the district of one of his enablers – Congressmen Ken Calvert (42nd Dist), Mike Garcia (25th Dist), Darrell Issa (50th Dist), Doug La Malfa (1st Dist), House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy (23rd Dist), Devin Nunes (22nd Dist) and Jay Obernolte (8th Dist) - please let them know that you condemn their complicity and will not tolerate continued sanctioning of or participation in the spread of misinformation.

#### **Human Trafficking**

January 11, 2021, was 'National Human Trafficking Awareness Day.' AAUW California supports efforts to combat Human Trafficking, as noted in our Public Policy Priorities: "Freedom from violence and fear of violence, including ...human trafficking...in homes, schools, workplaces and communities..."

Human Trafficking is the third largest organized criminal activity in the world. Human Trafficking is a modern-day form of slavery, with an estimated number of victims in the millions. Whether for labor or sex, men, women, and children are manipulated through force, fraud and coercion.

Research shows that people of color, especially the Black community, are more likely to experience some form of sex trafficking. Racial and economic biases drive both social and legal presumptions of "victims" having chosen their situation.

Law enforcement efforts against human trafficking are stronger today than in 2017, but still inadequate. Globally, definitions of human trafficking vary from country to country. Even using the term "slavery" is met with opposition in cases of forced marriages and cross border smuggling.

In California, legislation in the past few years includes support for victims, updating school health curriculum, and addressing hospitality industry training. But legislation is not the key, unless the public is educated as to the enormity of the issues, both locally and globally. ### SPOTLIGHT ON PRISCILLA ALQUIST



**P**riscilla Alquist, a very active member of our local AAUW Branch, has a true story to tell of women's advancement, determination and ability to seize the moment and move the next generation forward.

Priscilla was born in Hollywood, moved to into a new Burbank housing area where she and her sister lead a quiet, traditional family life with a yard, neighborhood, local church and Sunday family dinners. She was expected to do well in school, join Girl Scouts, participate in family camping vacations, fishing, berry picking, including travel to the 1962 World's Fair in Seattle.

Priscilla's grandmother, by herself and with 2 young daughters, arrived on a train to Pasadena from North Dakota to make a new life her herself and daughters in 1935. Her successful new life sent Priscilla's mom to USC and fired up Priscilla's grit and determination.

Priscilla's father was raised in a very non-traditional home in Cameroon, West Africa, by missionary parents until the age of 10, when his mother left him and his older brother in a missionary home for boys in Ohio. As an adult he was an experimental machinist, making prototypes, eventually moving into the new field of coating computer disks.

Priscilla's mom was a college educated housewife graduating from USC cum Laude in philosophy, a real thinker with systematic home management skills. She went to secretarial school, worked for the Navy in Washington D.C., returned home, and began the work of starting a traditional family.

After high school, Priscilla was ready to leave the safe and close community of Burbank, to head to her college choice of U.C. Berkeley. However, she was not prepared for this dramatic transition and the experience opened her eyes to a racially mixed, diverse world, while aiming toward a dietician degree. She married before her senior year, gained an Administrative Dietetic Internship at the University of Washington in Seattle, finishing as a Registered Dietitian.

Realizing that her marriage was not working, she returned to Burbank and began working at hospitals, as a therapeutic dietitian, hired by a food service management company. She traveled for this company throughout California and then on to New Mexico where she developed a strong interest in the Native American culture, which continues to this day. When offered the chance to be transferred to the Central Coast, Priscilla was ready, as she loved the area as a child on family vacations. In her new position, she enjoyed living in Morro Bay and working at the old San Luis Obispo County Hospital. Soon after, however, she was transferred to Marian Hospital in Santa Maria, where she earned the milestone of being the first woman hospital Food Service Director for the management company in the Western United States region. When the Food Service Director for the San Luis Coastal Schools position opened, she was excited to try working in a different venue and was hired.

At the same time, she joined her first service organization, Soroptimists International. She continued her work in Food Service for over twenty years, which included a position for the Ventura Unified School District, where she was able to continue in Soroptimists. She found that as economic circumstances changed, her flexibility allowed her to move where the jobs were.

While in Ventura, she met her husband, Jim, whom she married, and they started their family. Social unrest made working in Ventura a bit risky, so Priscilla found a job with Lucia Mar School District and at that time joined our AAUW Branch. Jim continued to work as a computer programmer for an independent contractor with Navy contracts at Point Mugu. Raising a very active young daughter kept both Jim and Priscilla busy with jobs, commuting and child care. After about 10 more years, in search of a less stressful job, Priscilla changed careers to spend more time with her family, earning an elementary credential, and teaching  $2^{nd}$  grade for Santa Maria Bonita School District.

Priscilla and Jim's daughter, Elizabeth, gained her ability to be progressive, adventurous, and academically accomplished through the support of her parents. Elizabeth and her husband took a year off from work, travelled around the world, hiked the Pacific Crest trail and more. Priscilla and Jim joined the couple in Bali, participating in a scuba diving trip, which is an activity still enjoyed by Priscilla.

Hobbies for Priscilla have included kayaking and scuba diving, camping, gardening, and travel all over the world. She planned to travel to Rwanda to visit the gorillas when COVID-19 broke out. All travel was cancelled. She and Jim have now set their sights on Australia and New Zealand, as well as the Baltics and Scandinavia. Quilting is a passion, shared with friends, enhanced by a room within her home devoted to quilting.

Priscilla's accomplishments are noteworthy as she was exceptionally innovative in the food service area, working in a man's world, establishing nutritious meals, salad bars and earning top ten recognition for her school district in California. She learned to put on that smiley face that many of us recognize, and move forward, regardless.

Be kind, be helpful to others, lead a conscious and moral life are Priscilla's words of wisdom. Support the causes you believe in within your community. Spread your efforts out from local to global. Work on projects. Gain world experiences and understanding of the values of others, see and paint the big picture. These thoughts serve as a guide to Priscilla's life and certainly help guide her activism with our AAUW Branch.

## Diversity, Equity and Inclusion


