CELEBRATING LITERACY

The United Nations' (UN) International Literacy Day annually falls on September 8 to raise people's awareness of and concern for literacy issues in the world.

According to UNESCO, about 774 million adults lack the minimum literacy skills. One in five adults is still not literate and two-thirds of them are women. About 75 million adults lack the minimum literacy skills. About 75 million children are out-of-school and many more attend irregularly or drop out. However, literacy is also a cause for celebration on the day because there are nearly four billion literate people in the world.

The UN General Assembly proclaimed a 10-year period beginning on January 1, 2003, as the United Nations Literacy Decade. The assembly also welcomed the International Plan of Action for the Decade and decided for UNESCO to take a coordinating role in activities at an international level within the decade's framework. On International Literacy Day each year, UNESCO reminds the international community of the status of literacy and adult learning globally. This day was first celebrated on September 8, 1966.

Special California Recall Election

September 14, 2021

All registered voters will get a ballot in the mail, beginning August 16. You have 3 ways to vote:

- Mail your ballot
- Drop off your ballot at a secure ballot drop off location in the county starting Tuesday, August 17
- Vote in person or drop off your ballot at a voting location.

Question: Shall Gavin Newsom be recalled (removed) from the office of Governor?

YES vote means

 If a majority of the votes on the recall question are "Yes," Governor Newsom shall be removed from office and the replacement candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected for the remainder of the governor's term of office.

NO vote means

 If one-half or more of the voters on the recall question are "No," Governor Newsom shall remain in office.

What happens after the recall election?

- If a majority of the voters vote "yes" on the first question, then the recall is successful and Governor Newsom will be removed from office. The replacement candidate who gets the most votes is elected for the remainder of the term of office (through January 2, 2023).
- If 50% or more of the voters vote "no" on the first question, then the recall has failed and the Governor Newsom will remain in office.

GUBERNATORIAL RECALL BALLOT

Following the recall question, all qualified replacement candidates for the office of governor will be listed. The candidates may list their qualified political party preference, or lack of qualified part preference, as well as their ballot designation (if the candidate chooses to provide that information) describing their principal occupations(s), profession(s), and/or vocation(s).

Write-in replacement candidates for the office of governor can also run in the California Gubernatorial Recall Election. The Certified List of Write-in Candidates will be available on September 3, 2021.

Recall ballots have two parts. Must voters vote on both parts of the recall ballot?

NO - Voters can vote on either one or both parts of the recall ballot. A voter can vote "no" to the question of removing the current elected officer from office and also select a replacement candidate.

Will a replacement candidate's political party preference and occupation be noted on a recall ballot?

<u>YES</u> - A replacement candidate's political party preference will be included on the ballot along with their occupation, if a ballot designation worksheet was filed with their county elections official and the candidate's ballot designation was approved by the Secretary of State.

SPOTLIGHT IN THE LIMELIGHT...PATTI MELSHEIMER

During World War II, Patti Melsheimer's mother was a "Rosie the riveter" in Oklahoma City. For health reasons, however, the family moved to Poston, Arizona where Patti's father worked in laundry for the Japanese concentration camp until the war ended. Upon returning home from Arizona, Patti's family lived in Oklahoma City, where she attended elementary school and one year of junior high.

Patti was expected to be a school teacher, as career choices were limited. She earned good grades and enjoyed an idyllic childhood. However, Patti's father had California dreaming fever, and when Patti was 13, the family moved to Montebello, California. She started junior high, and was active with her church youth group, which lead to a life-changing experience.

After high school graduation, she traveled on a school bus with 25 other youth across the U.S, staying at local churches, a tour that opened her life to new experiences. Patti began her college education at Chapman University, studying history and English, meeting her husband, Dick, when she was a junior. Patti and Dick became engaged during her senior year and with loving parental approval they married two weeks after graduation. Patti believes that it was her mother's pies that captured Dick's heart, but we all know it was Patti's sparkling mind and heart that sealed the deal.

After marriage, Patti began practice teaching through Cal State LA, but was dissuaded and

decided to work for a church agency in downtown LA. Studying at USC School of Social Work, she began her career of "taking care of people". Her first born son arrived just before her class finals so she switched to being a homemaker and commenced parenting her two sons, Eric and Peter. Being the curious



activist, she was introduced to AAUW through Dick's sister in Montebello and Monterey Park. This started Patti's committed relationship with AAUW for over 50 years.

After working for his father for several years, Dick decided to open his own business and Patti,

thinking practically, switched to working at a retirement home for medical coverage where she eventually become an administrator. With one son at Princeton and the other at The University of Pacific, Patti focused on a Masters in Gerontology and Public Administration at USC. She helped run Dick's business, but eventually began working for a government funded agency, providing services for seniors.

The two Melsheimer sons were working for the family business of manufacturing horizontal directional drilling tools when they all decided that a move to the Central Coast would be best, as Dick knew the area from his Cal Poly days and family camping. The Melsheimers moved the business and the families in October 1999. The move included Patti's mother, Peter and Eric and their families, along with 10 employees.

The Melsheimers enjoy close family connections, taking family vacations with three generations including their two sons, daughterin-law and grandchildren. Patti is especially proud of her family and the three generational family business, Melfred Borzall.

Patti's' biggest challenges were caring for her mother and caring for her daughter-in-law during her terminal illness. Train trips, travel, reading, church activities, tea parties and AAUW keep Patti focused and active. She hikes weekly, entertains often, enjoys cooking, socializing and politics, which she cares deeply about. She has always been a trail-blazing activist!

The Body: A Guide for Occupants, by Bill Bryson

The Book of Lost Names, by Kristin Harmel
