AAUW Five Cities Pismo Beach Scholarship Corporation Directors are pleased to announce the awarding of 10 scholarships of \$2,000 each to students from Arroyo Grande, Nipomo, New Tech High Schools and the AVID program within the Lucia Mar Unified School District, for a grand total of \$20,000. Anonymous donation gifts, totaling \$6,000, enhanced the ability to award additional AVID scholarships.

The Scholarship Cooperation Board of Directors is dedicated to provide scholarships to deserving young women and the applicants were exceptional this year. The Directors continue to recognize that scholarship awards would never be possible without the support of the Five Cities Pismo Beach AAUW Branch members and other donors. Thank you sincerely.

After receiving 30 applications, Directors screened and interviewed candidates. All students, young men and women in the senior AVID classes, were given tips on interviewing by Jean Burns Slater on March 22. Approximately 60 students were in attendance for the two presentations. At the April 6 Directors meeting scholarship awardees were selected.

PUBLIC POLICY

AAUW CA SPONSORS CALIFORNIA LEGISLATION


Guided by our member-approved Public Policy Priorities for 2021-2023, the AAUW California Public Policy Committee has selected the bills that we will be supporting as they move through the 2022 Session of the California Legislature. Here are the six highest priority bills:

- AB 92—creates an equitable sliding scale for family fees to alleviate the burden on working families struggling to pay for **childcare and early childhood education** services. Co-sponsor
- AB 1666—enables persons to come from outside California for **abortions** and not be impacted by laws of other states. Co-sponsor
- AB 1968—mandates the creation of websites at CSU/UC campuses to assist sexual assault survivors.
- AB 2881—Student parents get priority enrollment, registration, and access to basic needs centers, enabling them to remain in California colleges.
- SB 523—Expands contraceptive coverage by requiring health plans to provide point-of-sale coverage without cost-sharing.
- SB 1375—updates statutes relating to **abortion care** to allow nurse practitioners to practice under standard protocols to provide first-trimester abortion care.

Within our Public Policy Priorities, six bills are related to Economic Security for All Women, seven are related to Equal Access to Public Education, and 18 are related to Social and Racial Justice for all Members of Society.

AAUW California is experiencing greater visibility among elected legislators by sponsoring/cosponsoring bills.

The Public Policy Committee members spent many hours in March researching bills, and in discussions over two days, to select bills to support. AAUW members are working to improve the lives of women and children in California!

Jean Burns Slater was a middle child of six children born in San Diego, California, to parents living out in the country with few neighbors. Her dad served as a test pilot for the Ryan Aeronautical Company and later moved into management in the airplane manufacturing plant. Her mom was a homemaker and with six children - this was a double job!

Jean learned to go about her business, not drawing attention to herself, going along her merry way without undue attention. "Keep your mouth shut and your eyes and ears open," became her motto. She slipped through grade school, high school and college at a solid pace, anxious to get out on her own. She attended Grossmont Community College, as was expected in her family, and then graduated with a teaching credential from San Diego State University.

Teaching jobs were difficult to get in the early 70's. A job in Perris, CA was offered, so she moved to Hemet, CA, from San Diego with her husband and young daughter, becoming the wage earner

while the 70s experiment of dads staying home with the children was in full swing. It wasn't the expected success, so Jean took a job with San Luis Coastal USD, moving to Morro Bay to teach Home Economics and English to middle school students.

With Cal Poly close by, Jean earned a Master's degree in Home Economics. After a divorce, with summers free, she earned a Masters of Economic Education from the University of Delaware through a multiyear summer program. She then had the qualifications to teach economics at Morro Bay High. An Administrative Services Credential was the next step. Her reasoning was, "you either work for an administrator or be one," so she prepared herself to be one. She was hired as an Assistant Principal at Laguna Middle School in San Luis Obispo and over the course of nine years served as Principal, as well.

During that time, the Diarist Superintendent offered administrators the opportunity to earn a doctorate in Education Administration through a University of Southern California satellite program. All she had to do was work hard, take classes on Saturdays, spend summers at USC, and pay half of the tuition - while promising to stay with SLCUSD for two years after she earned her Ed.D. This was an opportunity she could not pass up, even though she was working full time as a middle school principal. Her daughter had graduated from high school and college, so parenting responsibilities were at a minimum. Two of Jean's siblings had already earned their doctorates, so sibling competition was alive and encouraging.

Once she earned her doctorate Jean realized that she would need to move out of the area to advance in the ranks of education administration. An Associate Superintendent of Secondary Programs with San Rafael City Schools in the Bay area was the next step. She met her husband while she was in San Luis Obispo. They married after both secured jobs in Marin County. Working long hours in an intense situation taught Jean that weekend jaunts were a necessity. She and her husband, Michael, took advantage of every opportunity they could find in the Bay area. Michael retired from his

Chief Financial Officer job with Larkspur School District and Jean knew she needed to find a new job and home beyond the 640 square foot, third floor apartment in San Rafael. Her next job was Superintendent of San Benito High School District in Hollister, CA. This required a move to Hollister, where she purchased a home. This was her final career move and, after making a decision to retire, she and Michael moved back to the Central Coast, into Michael's home in Arroyo Grande that had been rented.

Jean first joined AAUW in 1975-76 when she was teaching at Morro Bay High. She continued to search out AAUW Branches with each move, and joined the Five Cities Pismo Beach Branch once she settled in Arroyo Grande in 2008. She served as Co-Program director with Patti Melsheimer and has since held various positions within the Branch.

Travel has been a passion in Jean's life. She believes in sharing and appreciating other cultures, sharing wealth by staying in local hotels, using local transportation, modeling the authentic US citizen in contrast to preconceptions. Rustic and purpose-lead adventure travel are the basic elements of her travel style. She is also a U.S. National Parks nut, with car camping always a highlight.

Jean is well connected with her five siblings and their families, thoroughly enjoys the company of her daughter and her husband and three grandchildren, and feels fortunate to be part of a greater picture of world, national, state and local affairs through AAUW and other interests.
