AAUW California Celebrates Black Women in History for Black History Month, February 2023

Many Black women have made significant contributions to history, thought, society, innovation, science, government, civil rights, women's rights, and much more. For Black History month we celebrate the achievements of but a few:

<u>Sojourner Truth</u>, a former slave, became an outspoken advocate for abolition, temperance, and civil and women's rights (1797-1883).

<u>Rosa Parks and Claudette Colvin</u> (age 15) helped initiate the Civil Rights movement by refusing to give up their seats to white men on Montgomery, Alabama buses. Their actions inspired resulted in the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that bus segregation was unconstitutional.

<u>Dorothy Jean Dandridge</u> was an actress, singer and dancer, the first African American film star to be nominated for the Academy Award for Best Actress for her performance in *Carmen Jones* (1954).

<u>Katherine Johnson</u>, a brilliant mathematician, was one of three Black students to integrate West Virginia's graduate schools. Her greatest contribution was to space exploration through her calculations synching Apollo's Lunar Module with the lunar-orbiting Module. She also worked on the Space Shuttle. (1958-1986)

<u>Madam C.J. Walker</u> was considered the wealthiest African-American businesswoman in America (1911-1919), by developing and marketing a line of cosmetics and hair care products for Black women. She hired 40,000 "ambassadors" to sell her products.

<u>Shirley Chisholm</u> was the first Black woman elected to Congress in 1968. She served as a representative from New York for 14 years, was the first Black candidate to run for president in the 1972 race, and founded the Congressional Black Caucus in 1971 and the Congressional Women's Caucus in 1977.

<u>Mae Jemison</u> became the first Black woman to fly to space on the space shuttle Endeavour. She was also the first Black woman admitted to the astronaut training program, in 1987.

<u>Toni Morrison</u> released her novel *Beloved* in 1987, winner of the Pulitzer Prize, based on the true story of an African American enslaved woman. In 1993, Morrison became the first Black woman to win the Nobel Prize in Literature.

<u>Oprah Winfrey</u>, born into poverty in rural Mississippi to a single teenage mother, molested as a child and pregnant at 14, became the most influential woman in the world by many accounts. An American talk show host, television producer, actress, author, and philanthropist, she was the richest African-American of the 20th century and was once the world's only black billionaire.

- The Annual California AAUW meeting will be on April 22, 2023. More info will be coming.
- National AAUW is working on streamlining their bylaws. Nothing was said about how that would translate to state and local branches though. See page 9 for potential National bylaw changes
- The decision was made at National not to have a vote on changing membership requirements this year. They will try again next year. Only 400 votes determined the outcome last time.

EQUITY a Definition

• justice according to natural law or right specifically: freedom from bias or favoritism

• something that is equitable Source: <u>Merriam-Webster Dictionary</u> Every AAUW member should understand what we mean by equity. After all, we are the nation's premier organization fighting for gender equity. We fight to narrow the pay gap for women, champion equal opportunity for women in education, and work together to support laws and policies that enable women's success. You may wonder why we have a resource on a term we're all familiar with: Because even with all our understanding, there's still something we can learn.

Equity vs. Equality

Although these two words have the same root, they do not mean the same thing. They are often used interchangeably, even though they differ in meaning. Equality means everyone gets the same access to — or amount of — something. Equity, by contrast, is about everyone having equal access to what they need to be successful. And those needs can be quite different.

You may be familiar with <u>Angus Maguire's images</u> of three children standing on boxes to watch a ballgame over the fence. In the first image, each of the children has one of the same-sized box: equality. However, because the children are different heights, the shortest child still can't see. In the second image, the tallest child, who does not need a box to see over the fence, gives theirs to the shortest of the children, enabling all of the children to see over the fence: equity! The key difference here is fairness in the distribution of resources (the boxes) to each child enabling them to all achieve their goal (seeing the game).

Mission: To advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy. AAUW needs all these things together — diversity, inclusion, equity and belonging — for our branches to continue to grow and thrive.

AAUW NATIONAL BOARD NEWS

The National Board of AAUW is proposing some significant changes in the National Bylaws,

which will be posted as a proposal for a vote in the spring. These revisions include:

- Revising the wording describing AAUW's charitable purpose.
- Eliminating the requirement for 60 days' notice before board approval of a dues change.
- Having board officers elected by the board, not the membership.
- Eliminating any reference to conventions when discussing meetings of the membership.
