Chairperson, Linda Lidberg attended the state level meeting and provided the following information. Tech Trek will be both virtual and in-person camps in 2023. The committee plans to send six girls to UCSB camp at \$1150 per camper. The Board supported the agreement to send six campers in July. One alternate will be selected as well. Because two schools, Stanford and possibly Whittier, are not conducting Tech Trek this coming summer, the number of slots for attendees will be reduced.

Applications are all electronic, and teachers may not approach a possible candidate for

Tech Trek without first contacting the parent of that student. Linda will contact the LMUSD and find if they have hired a STEAM coordinator. If so, Linda may contact that person to assist with finding possible Tech Trek candidates.

A new location for interviews must be found to replace a site at the LMUSD if the interviews are held on a non-school day. Two rooms are needed. The library was suggested as well as a community room in Avila. Tech Trek held a contest for a new logo, and one of our campers from July '22 designed the winning logo! McKenna Rose was awarded \$250 from Tech Trek. Congratulations McKenna.

This virtual program for high school junior and senior girls is designed to elevate the next generation to pursue careers in public service and elected office. Over five two-hour sessions, students will engage in interactive and inspiring activities with exposure to women legislators, career options, and the inner workings of a political campaign. The program will culminate in a group competition to create a realistic campaign simulation.

#### **Purpose**

Gov Trek is designed to address the paucity of women in the halls of power to consider careers in public service and elected office. One of the priorities of AAUW's core mission is to inform and empower girls in an effort to close the gender gap in traditionally male-dominated fields.

#### **Program Format**

Gov Trek is conducted online in <u>five two-hour Saturday sessions</u>, each with a different focus related to careers in politics, public service and the inner workings of a political campaign. Students learn from speakers and panelists, including current and former legislators, staffers, and consultants, and then work in groups with an adult facilitator to complete activities such as writing speeches or designing political messages. The final project to create a campaign simulation is a team competition judged by VIP industry judges with awards in several categories.

Gov Trek is designed, delivered, and administered by AAUW California. Student recruitment is managed by the 90+ local AAUW branches across California.

The program is free for students to attend.

#### **NOVEMBER 8TH WAS A GOOD DAY FOR WOMEN!**

The election is finally over and overall, AAUW members can be pretty happy with the results. Here are a few highlights:

- One woman was added to each house of Congress: the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate, bringing the numbers to 124 (H) and 25 (S).
- Of the total of 149, 54 are women of color.
- With Nancy Pelosi stepping down as Speaker of the House, we lost the most powerful woman's voice in government, but still have a woman on the minority leadership team, Minority Whip Katherine Clark.
- Governors of 12 states are now women.

- 23% of all mayors across the nation are women, including our brand new and first woman mayor of Los Angeles, Karen Bass.
- 32 women won seats in the California Legislature (total confirmed 44, 3 pending)
- All executive positions in California except Governor are filled by women, including Secretary of State, Lieutenant Governor, Treasurer, and Controller.
- Proposition 1 prevailed and women's right to control their own reproductive choices is now enshrined in our constitution.

The California Public Policy Committee thanks each and every AAUW California member who voted, who assisted in our Voter Education (VE) campaign by spreading our messages on social media, who took the pledge to vote for Prop 1 (we had 437 sign up!), and who worked within their branches to do their own VE events. **Next challenge**: let's add California to that list of states with a woman governor! Together we can – and will – change the world!



#### **Inclusion**

#### Definition of *inclusion*

the act of including: the state of being included the act or practice of including and accommodating people who have historically been excluded (as because of their race, gender, sexuality or ability) Source; Merriam-Webster Dictionary

Diversity is only the beginning, and it isn't enough. To create truly diverse spaces, those spaces also need to be inclusive, where all parties feel welcomed, appreciated and respected — and have full access to all resources and can contribute to AAUW's success.

As diversity advocate Verna Myers once said, "Diversity is being invited to the party, and inclusion is being asked to dance." If you don't have both, neither works.

#### **Diversity vs. Inclusion**

Diversity refers to characteristics, the dimensions that make each of us unique. Inclusion entails behaviors and actions that make us feel welcomed or not. An environment that creates a sense of belonging, where everyone feels welcomed and included, is essential for the success of diversity efforts.

To be truly inclusive, we often have to change the culture — and culture shifts can make people uncomfortable or give the sense that they are losing something. But that is absolutely not the case. In fact, the exact opposite is true: Research suggests that in environments where people feel supported, welcomed, respected and valued are actually more productive; everyone feels a greater connection to the organization's mission.

#### Inclusion vs. Belonging

If diversity means the characteristics that make us unique, and inclusion refers to behaviors and actions, then what is belonging? And why is it important?

Belonging is feeling like you are a part of something, that you, actually you, matter. It isn't necessarily about being liked — but rather being needed.

AAUW needs all of these things together — diversity, inclusion, and belonging — for our branches to continue to grow and thrive.



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
