MAY BOARD MEETING

The May Board meeting will be held Monday, May 5 at 6:30 p.m. via Zoom. If you or your committee have an action item to place on the agenda, forward it to Jean Burns Slater, <u>jbslater2006@gmail.com</u>, by May 1 for it to be considered at this meeting.

MEMBERSHIP DUES

The cost of everything is rising and we are finding that the dues for National AAUW is increasing by \$2 for 2025-2026 and AAUW CA membership is voting for a \$10 increase. To cover these anticipated increases our AAUW Broad is asking for our dues to increase to \$120, an increase of \$15. Currently our dues have been \$105 for several years.

We determine any dues increase by vote at our Annual Meeting on April 28, when we also vote on our slate of officers. The result of the California vote will not be counted until after we hold our annual meeting and determine our dues for 2025-2026. Therefore, we are asking for this increase in anticipation of the AAUW CA dues increase.

Here is a breakdown of your current AAUW dues:

Five Cities Pismo Beach Branch receives \$13 per member from the \$105 annual dues.

National receives \$72 and CA receives \$20 of the \$105.

Our Branch has absorbed National dues increases in the past to avoid raising overall dues for members. National will raise their dues to \$74 in 2025 and \$76 in 2026

California AAUW has not raised their dues for 10 years. Branch members have seen significant improvement in the responsiveness, web site resources and projects from AAUW CA. We have been honored to have the Past President Sandi Gabe and the Past Public Policy Chair Kathi Harper visit our Branch personally. Kathi came to our Branch activities twice. We have received an excellent webinar on Project 2025 and have benefited from the School Board Project and many other aspects of AAUW CA. AAUW CA Public Policy is well thought out and supported by AAUW CA actions through Lobby Day, publishing flyers of priorities, advocating throughout the State. Gov Trek, Tech Trek, Speech Trek are all AAUW CA programs. Reference www.aauw-ca.org for a quick look at the robust web site and available resources.

If we approve this dues increase of \$15, for an annual dues of \$120, we will have covered the expected increase for CA dues and the increase of National dues for 2026. Thank you for supporting your local, state, and national AAUW.

SCHOOL BOARD PROJECT

Take Action to Help Kids Feel Safe at School

Many of our members have expressed concerns about the potential for ICE raids in our local schools. These intrusions on school grounds are already happening in some places, and are having a significant detrimental impact on these families, especially for their children. Some of the ramifications have included:

- Parents not showing up at school events fearing agents might be there
- Students do not want to come to school, fearing their parents will be taken while they are gone
- Children not learning, consumed by fear of agents coming on campus to take them away Here are some things you should know:

- Current law (Plyler v Doe 1982) held that all children, even undocumented, have a constitutional right to free public education
- In 2011, DHS issued the "Sensitive Locations" policy, which prohibited raids from certain places including schools
- Although the President has attempted to revoke the order, **Executive Orders and Actions** cannot change statutes or regulations
- There are currently 4 lawsuits challenging the attempted revocation; 3 from churches have been successful so far, 1 from a school in Denver has resulted in a denial of a request for a temporary injunction
- Current law also prohibits ICE entry on campuses without a warrant
- Even if they have a warrant to enter, that does not entitle them to have access to private/protected student records

Here are two things you can do:

- Urge your school boards/districts to issue a "Safe Zone" Resolution template can be found here: Guidance on Immigration Issues | NEA
- Engage your branch members in a postcard-writing campaign to their school boards with following message: WE STAND WITH Immigrant students LGBTQ+ youth

AAUW California Elections - Importance of Public Policy

Candidates to fill open board seats include Missy Mysceko and Amy Horn (current co-chairs of Public Policy). Our work is now more important than ever as California must be a stopgap to protect our residents from the federal attacks on our rights.

Actions to take now to protect voting rights

<u>Self- Education</u>: Voting initiatives like the <u>SAVE Act</u> and <u>CA AB25</u> (failed on April 9) serve to disenfranchise others as well as the targeted populations - investigate by clicking the titles. <u>Focused actions</u>: Tell your friends and neighbors about the potential impacts of these two acts <u>Political Actions</u>: Join <u>2-Minute</u> activist platform to voice opposition

<u>AAUW California Public Policy</u> has its own Bluesky account. We are just getting started, but we plan to use this account to send out statelevel legislative action alerts, promote Resistbot petitions, and provide real-time updates. **We encourage you to create your own account, if you have not yet done so, and follow us!** With the gracious blessings of the California State Board (thank you!), AAUW California Public Policy now <u>has its own social media account-</u>-on <u>BlueSky</u>!

<u>Priority Legislation 2025:</u> Stand up for the transgender community.

- Transgender and non-binary people make up a very small proportion of our population: estimated between 0.5%-1.6%.
- Excessive anti-transgender legislation arises from a position of animus, not neutral laws.
- The legislation is frequently focused on trans women and regulating femininity.
- AAUW's mission is to advance gender equity to ALL women and girls.
- The infringement on trans and nonbinary rights is inseparable from broader attempts to restrict women based on gender stereotyping.

Public Policy AAUW 2025 Legislative Agenda

- Support SB 771 "Social Media Platform Endangering Californians": a social media platform may be liable for civil penalty under existing law if and when its algorithms or AI aid or abet individual users who are engaging in already unlawful intimidation of others in online spaces.
- Oppose AB 579 "Yaeli's Law" This bill rests on the premise that denial of support for youth self-identity, including refusal to use a child's name and pronouns, or refusal to provide or allow their gender-affirming care, is not harmful and therefore should not be considered child

abuse under the law, and, accordingly, not be allowed as a basis for custody or removal decisions.

- Support SB 418 "Ensure Equal Access to Care for All" This bill would prohibit a health plan or a health insurance provider from denying coverage or denying benefits to a person based upon their race, color, national origin, age, disability, or sex including sex characteristics such as intersex traits, pregnancy, and gender identity.

Concerns about the safety of children at school

Related to the

- ICE raids
- Children_fear for parents which manifests itself in keeping children home, in parents not attending school meetings and events
- Children's inability to focus in school because of fear for their parents' safety.

<u>You should know:</u> by law all children have a right to free public education; DHS policy prevents raids on schools; ICE is prevented by law from raiding campuses without a warrant, and even with a warrant they are prohibited from accessing student records.

ACTIONS you can take:

- Urge your district to issue a Safe Zone regulation
- Engage branch members and neighbors to join a postcard writing campaign to school boards with following message: We stand with immigrant children and LGBTQ+ youth. It is happening in our local Lucia Mar Unified School District. Be alert and support all our children








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
