Keep marching. Keep optimistic. It's a Pep talk. It's for us, too.



Our newest project was providing supplies for AVID classes and it was quite successful. We budgeted \$1000 for supplies for senior classes at the three high schools: Arroyo Grande High has 233 AVID seniors; Nipomo High has 107 AVID seniors; and New Tech has 55 AVID seniors. The supplies were divided proportionally, New Tech (1unit); Nipomo (2units); Arroyo Grande (4units) and delivered the second week in May.

The board will decide at the summer planning meeting if and how much we can provide AVID for the 2025–2026 school year. Yay us! University women helping students and teachers.



For a contribution of only \$50, your ad will appear in our annual Member Directory and our monthly online newsletter. Our members spread the word about our advertisers to friends and family as well. Moreover, your contribution will help us continue our important projects in the local community. Our fundraising activities support three on-going programs that benefit students in the Lucia Mar Unified School District.

- College Scholarships. These are awarded to girls graduating from our local high schools to help cover the cost of
 their first year of college. This year we awarded scholarships to ten accomplished young women who have
 worked hard to excel in both academic and extra-curricular activities, including volunteer work. Each young
 woman will begin a pathway to attend or attend a four-year college or university in the fall.
- 2. Tech Trek Scholarships. These awards enable local middle-school girls, nominated by their math or science teachers, to attend a week-long residential science camp devoted to hands-on experiences in the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) fields. Such experiences can be critical in encouraging girls to pursue their science and math interest in high school and college and lead them to careers in STEM fields. The girls from our branch typically attend Tech Trek Camp at the University of California, Santa Barbara campus.
- 3. Eager Readers: Through this program AAUW purchases books that are donated to students in Grades 1 through 6 to select elementary schools within the Lucia Mar Unified School District. Branch members visit the schools and encourage students to select a new book to take home and keep. For some children this is the first book they have owned. This is true book gifting. Approximately 600 books were distributed to over 600 students in 2024-2025.

SCHOOL BOARD PROJECT

Local community members, fueled by Mom's for Liberty and The Harvest Church in Arroyo Grande, are urging school districts throughout San Luis Obispo County to align with President Donald Trump's executive orders such as "keeping men out of women's sports." The Lucia Mar Unified School District was inundated with speakers on this issue during the last two school board meetings, with one student's comments garnering nationwide attention. The culture wars are here in our local district.

AAUW concerns include keeping schools safe for all children.

Here are some things you should know:

- Current law (Plyler v Doe 1982) held that all children, even undocumented, have a constitutional right to free public education
- In 2011, DHS issued the "Sensitive Locations" policy, which prohibited raids from certain places including schools
- Although the President has attempted to revoke the order, **Executive Orders and Actions** cannot change statutes or regulations
- There are currently 4 lawsuits challenging the attempted revocation; 3 from churches have been successful so far, 1 from a school in Denver has resulted in a denial of a request for a temporary injunction
- Current law also prohibits ICE entry on campuses without a warrant
- Even if they have a warrant to enter, that does not entitle them to have access to private/protected student records
- The US Dept of Ed recently sent out a "Dear Colleague" letter to all school districts threatening to withhold funding if they do not eliminate DEI, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. (You can read the letter here: https://www.ed.gov/media/document/title-ix-enforcement-directive-dcl- 109477.pdf
- Executive Orders and Actions cannot change statutes or regulations

- Engage your branch members in a postcard-writing campaign to their school boards with following message: WE STAND WITH Immigrant students LGBTQ+ youth

AAUW of California Public Policy Presents: Answers to Questions About Transgender Allyship

AAUW's mission is to advance gender equity for all girls and women as girls and women have historically been marginalized on the basis of gender. But feminized and gender-based forms of marginalization are intersectional, which means that, for some, marginalization occurs in many ways at the same time. For transgender women and girls, they must, at the very least, deal with the same kinds of misogyny that many cisgender (1) women face on a daily basis AND, at the same time, deal with the kinds of hatred and erasure that comes along with being trans and nonbinary in the United States in this political moment.

When AAUW says that we support ALL girls and women, that means we always support transgender girls and women, and that we offer them extra support right now, at a time when their need is greatest.

As AAUW California has responded by engaging in personal and public advocacy for transgender rights and protections, the Public Policy team has also been fielding questions about how to best have conversations about transgender rights and issues. We started this guide to share out some of this guidance more broadly.

This guide is for anyone who wants to continue to be an ally to transgender and nonbinary people. It is meant to be a complement to existing guides, such as those produced by well-known gender equity and transgender and nonbinary support organizations such as:

While some of the existing guides already contain important information about inclusive language and terminology, the AAUW of California Public Policy guide is unique in that it specifically focuses on how to have everyday conversations about transgender and nonbinary social and policy issues, offering sample responses to common questions that members have encountered as they are engaged in allyship and advocacy work.

This guide is also a living document that will be updated regularly, based on AAUW California members' and users' questions. So if you have questions that you would like to see addressed, questions that you have as someone trying to be a better ally to transgender and nonbinary people and/or questions that you have encountered that you were not sure how to answer, please click THIS LINK to submit them. Being a good ally involves a lifetime of unlearning and relearning. This means that a<u>llyship work should be active</u>, engaged, and ongoing. It should be driven by the wants and needs of the communities that you seek to be an ally to, for, and with.

Doing public policy, advocacy, and allyship work will most certainly require you to have <u>conversations across difference</u>. These conversations can be uncomfortable and difficult, but they are extremely important.

We thank you for having these conversations with others, for engaging in advocacy, and for using your power and privilege for the benefit of all. We hope that this guide is useful for you as you continue to engage in this important work.




